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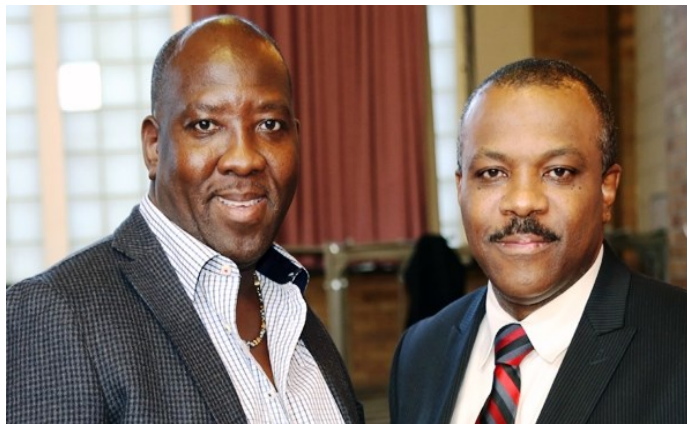
Special points of interest:

Fire reeks havoc at a local gas station in Hinche

On Thursday March 18, 2016 seven people burned to death and 30 others were seriously hurt with 4-6 degree burns when a fuel truck exploded in Hinche, 110 kilometers (70 miles) from Port-au-Prince. The truck crashed into a wall and fuel spilled into the streets, igniting when it came into contact with the cooking fires of roadside vendors. Hinche does not have a functional fire station. Approximately 5 miles away, there is a fire station, but no fire truck or firefighting equipment. The members of the community had no disaster training, nor risk mitigation principles that could have helped them. To assist in the relief efforts was 2 ambulance that OSDPC currently operates in a partnership with St. Therese Hospital to increase its emergency response capabilities.

We are very fortunate in the western world to have modern, well-staffed and well-funded fire services to protect our property and keep us safe from fires. OSDPC’s goal is to supply safe and reliable equipment to protects firefighters on the ground. OSDPC believes that assisting in the development and capacity building of fire services in Hinche will lead to a safer and higher quality of life for the people of Haiti by reducing the risk of losing homes, property and lives to uncontrolled fire.
